WMGA Foundation **2024 Scholarship Recipients**

She attended Girls to the Tee Westchester where she, "had the opportunity to see other girls with the same passion for golf as me." During high school, in collaboration with the First Tee of Metropolitan New York, she designed a 10-week coding academy for intercity middle schoolers. She was captain and social media manager of her varsity golf team and helped lead her team to their first State Championship.



Marisa Flores graduated from Immaculate Heart Academy this past spring and is excited to attend Quinnipiac University this fall where she anticipates specializing in Sports and Entertainment Marketing in a 3+1 MBA accelerated program. Her outside activities included being a member of the national honor society and serving as a peer mentor.

Marisa, who heard about the WMGA Foundation as a result of playing in the Maureen Orcutt, didn't start playing golf until the 6th grade and she described her first few years as playing catch up to her peers who played golf since they were 5 or 6. 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
